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

**ETHIOPIAN SOUTHERN OMO TRIBES AND SURMA REGION**

**Duration: 16 Days / 15 Nights**



### **Tour Highlights:**

- Explore the fascinating and strange cultures of the indigenous tribes of Ethiopia in a modern, air-conditioned 4WD.
- Visit the Gurage, the Oromo, the Menit, the Konso, the Woito, the Hamar, the Karo, the Gelab, the Arbore, the Tsemay and the Oromo Borena in their villages
- Explore the rich culture of the Surma tribe, well known for their stick fighting
- Get to know the Mursi, where the women insert clay discs in their lower lips as a sign of beauty
- Get to know the traditional lifestyles, colorful dresses and strange rituals as well as amazing hairstyles, body-painting or scaring
- Enjoy indigenous forest and savannah as well as tea, coffee and spice plantations
- Shop the stalls of Merkato, the largest open-air market in Africa
- Traditional Ethiopian farewell dinner with “coffee ceremony” and traditional dances of different ethnic groups.

### **Travel date:**

Every day departure with a minimum of two participants.

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**Day 1: Arrival in Addis Ababa**

On arrival our representative will meet you at the airport and transfer you to your hote. An overview of the program will be given. The rest of the day visit historical sites in Addis Ababa, including the National Archeological Museum, where the 3.6 million year old remains of Lucy rest, whose skeletal remains were discovered in 1974. You will also visit the Ethnological Museum, the Holy Trinity Cathedral and Mount Entoto which rises up to an altitude of 3200meters and offers a panoramic view of the metropolis. Overnight 4-star hotel.

**Day 2: Addis Ababa-Jimma**

On the way to Jimma we will visit the Gurage and Oromo people and their villages. On the way we cross the magnificent Gibe Gorge and the Gibe River. After lunch stop in Walkite continue to Jimma through coffee and chat plantations. Jimma was the capital of the former Keffa province and is now inhabited by Oromo, Kefecho and Kulo people.



**Day 3: Jimma-Mizan Teferi**

Drive 240 km to Mizan Teferi through Ethiopian indigenous forest. The people living in this area are Kefecho, Yem and Bench tribes. This place is famous for coffee, tea and spice growing.

**Day 4: Kibish**

Continue driving further to the west to Kibish through the Bebeke coffee plantation - Ethiopia's largest and oldest coffee plantation. On the way visit the Menit tribe. After crossing the Akobo River we drive through African savannah grassland. After lunch stop in Dimma drive on to Tulgit and Kibish, which are small towns of the Surma people. The rest of the days walk around your campsite and visit the Surma people. Camping in Kibish



**Day 5: In Kibish**

If there is any Donga (Stick fighting of the Surma people) in the morning, you will attend it. Otherwise you walk around the Kibish village and visit more Surma villages (14 km round trip). The Surma people are renowned for the strange custom followed by their women who, on reaching maturity, have their lower lips slit and clay discs inserted. The Surma men are well known for their stick fighting. Players are usually unmarried men. The winner is carried away on a platform of poles to a group of girls waiting at the side of the arena who decide among themselves which of them will ask for his hand in marriage. Taking part in a stick fight is considered to be more important than winning it. Camping at Kibish



**Day 6: Kibish - Mizan Teferi**

Drive the same way back via the town of Dima to Bebeke, which lies near Mizan Teferi. Camping in Bebeke

**Day 7: Mizan Teferi- Jimma**

Drive back 240 km to Jimma, along coffee, tea and spice plantations and dense forest.

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**Day 8: Drive Arba Minch**

Drive through lush, green hills and valleys to Arba Minch via Cheda. Arba Minch - meaning 'Forty Springs' - takes its name from the bubbling streams that cover the forest and the flats of the town.



**Day 9: Doze Village, Lake Chamo**

After breakfast visit the Dorze tribe and their village, famed for their bee hive shaped houses and their weaving skills.



Weaving is a primary profession for many Dorze. They are also farmers, who prevent soil erosion by ingenious terracing of the mountainsides. Around their huts they have their own little garden with vegetables, spices, tobacco and enset (false-banana or musa ensete). In the afternoon take a boat trip on Lake Chamo, where you can spot many hippos and a most spectacular concentration of giant crocodiles. The water birds are great the scenery is truly unforgettable. Locals fish here in

traditional boats for Nile Perch.

**Day 10: Drive Jinka**

After breakfast drive to Konso where you visit the Konso people, known for colorful dresses and unusually engraved wooden statues, used as grave markers. Continue along impressive land terracing to the village of the Woito people, near the Woito river. On the way to Jinka stop at the Key Afer Market (Thursday is market day), a tribal market, where different ethnic groups gather to sell and buy their agricultural products.



**Day 11: Jinka – Mursi - Jinka - Turmi**

After breakfast leave Jinka and drive to the Mursi village to visit and appreciate the very attractive culture of the Mursi tribe. They are renowned for the strange custom followed by their women who, on reaching maturity, have their lower lips slit and circular clay discs inserted. Proceed to Mago National Park. Then drive back to Jinka and continue to Turmi through Dimeka to visit the Hamer people and their village. Turmi is a small town, which is the base to visit the Hamer village.



**Day 12: In Turmi**

After breakfast drive to Karo viillage and visit the Karo people in the afternoon visit the hammer village. Hamers have remarkable hairstyles made from ochre, water and binding resin. They rub the mixture into their hair then twist the strands repeatedly to create coppery-colored locks. This is a sign of wealth and welfare. Hamers are considered to be masters of body decoration.

**Day 13: Turmi—Omorate excursion – Turmi**

Morning drive to Omorate to visit the Gelab (Dassanech) tribe inhabiting the riverbanks of the Omo River. Cross the Omo River in a small boat and walk fifteen minutes to their village. The Gelabs are also known for their body painting. In the afternoon drive back to Turmi for camping.

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<p><b>Day 14: Turmi - Yabello</b> Drive to Yabello visiting the Arbore and the Tsemay people en route. After lunch stop at Konso, continue to the region of Oromo Borena and visit their village, which are well known in cattle rearing. From their deep 'singing well' they carry water to their cattle by forming a long line of people and passing on the buckets while singing.</p> <p><b>Day 15: Yabello - Awassa</b> Drive from Yabello to Awassa through the beautiful Sidamo mountains and wide coffee plantations. In the late afternoon walk by the side of Lake Awassa</p> <p><b>Day 16: Awassa - Addis Ababa, Departure</b> Drive back to Addis along the Great Rift Valley lakes. Visit the fish market in Awassa, where local people buy fish from the fisher men. En route we stop on the viewing points of Lake Shala, Abyta and Langano. Evening fare well dinner party in a traditional Ethiopian restaurant with dances from the different ethnic Groups. Afterwards transfer to the airport for departure</p>
